MSU Retirees volunteer to help Old Newsboys reach goals

n the early morning hours of Dec. 6, 2018, a hardy group of volunteers gathered to collect funds to support the Old Newsboys fund raising campaign. MSURA has participated in this event for several years. This year participants collected \$3,183.22. The Old Newsboys in total raised more than \$177,000 in this campaign exceeding their goal of \$174,000. New this year was the ability to send a donation via text.

MSURA participation made a difference in our community. A special thank you goes to Bruce Smith, who led the effort to organize MSURA volunteers, and Vern Johnson who has been a longtime supporter of Old Newsboys.

The Old Newsboys Association of Greater Lansing has been operating since 1924, raising funds for footwear for children to attend school and stay healthy. Each December hundreds of volunteers stand on street corners and in front of businesses with collection jugs and a spoof newspaper to encourage people to donate whatever they can. 100 percent of donations on Sales Day in December goes toward shoes and boots for more than 7,000 children within a 25-mile radius of Lansing.

Then we travel to the **Gilmore Car Museum**, which is the largest auto museum in North America with over 180,000 square feet of exhibit space. The museum started in the early 1960s when Donald Gilmore began collecting vintage automobiles, including a 1920 Pierce Arrow, which is still on display. This is a self guided tour with

New 1855 building provides lovely gateway to campus

he shiny new building southwest of the Harrison-Kalamazoo intersection catches the eye. Especially in the evening, the light sculpture "Juniper" heralds the future with programmable lights. It also honors history by form and name (after the red cedar, Juniperus Virginiana). It's a lovely new gateway to MSU.

Two gateways, actually. First, the office building houses a front door for much of Spartan student life and public events. Athletics tickets, dining tickets and plans, student housing, and student jobs are all available here. Call this the "1855 Place offices." Second, the 1855 Place offices front some fresh concepts in University housing,

through a cluster of new where the mid-fifties University

Village once stood. Call this the "1855 Place Residences."

The 1855 Place offices house the central offices of the Athletics Department and Residential and Hospitality Services. The Athletics headquarters has left Jenison Fieldhouse behind, and occupies the fourth floor of the building. Residential and Hospitality Services (RHS) has consolidated from offices all across campus to the first, second, and third floors of the new building. More than 200 staff — across both departments — now occupy the offices and related facilities in the 100,000 square foot building.

RHS moved six discrete departments to

the 1855 Place offices: Business and Finance, Culinary Services, Human Resources & Payroll, Information Services, Planning & Projects and the Residence Education and Housing Services.

The visiting retiree might enter the south end of the 1855 Place offices, from the convenient faculty-staff parking ramp fifty yards south of the office building. Watch carefully: the energy efficient lighting in the ramp follows traffic and pedestrians. The office building, dedicated in October, 2018, is in the process for Silver certification under USGBC LEED standards, which includes stringent energy conservation requirements.

■irst impressions are driven by the soaring Hall of Champions celebration of Spartan athletics champions throughout University history. In addition to the service desks and offices along the hallway, you can follow the larger history of the university in captioned photographs.

A retiree visiting the building hit a trifecta of sorts in one visit recently. He checked at the Athletics Tickets desk about an elevator pass for the upcoming football game, inquired about retiree discounts for campus dining (lost in the midst of time, sadly!) and reconnected with other retirees and staff in the Starbucks coffee shop. All this on the first floor, along the "main street" open corridor. He missed two stops: the Spartan Spirit Shop and Sparty's Market.

The architecture is functional and contemporary, bright and open. Throughout the

building, large windows eliminate most of the need for lighting in the first-floor public spaces, especially the first half of the business day. Upstairs offices are generally open plan, welcoming daylight for most offices at least half the day. Conference rooms, utility rooms, elevators, and restrooms occupy the core of the building. There are few "false ceilings" as utility-distribution spaces are open above each floor. Easy access to cable trays and ductwork ease maintenance and open up air circulation.

Bill Whitbeck, RHS Planning and Projects office, summed up the substantial benefits of consolidating RHS offices from two perspectives, stressing customer service first.

"For students and many visitors, we have a one-stop service center," he said. "Housing, meals, jobs, it's all here. Plus athletic tickets."

And he also stressed the efficiencies of sensible centralization for RHS.

"We consolidated six or eight departments into this building; we were in eight different buildings," he said. "Being here is invaluable in face-to-face meetings. I only have to go through these offices, or just one floor to meet with most anybody I work with regularly."

The 1855 Place Residences west of the office building include apartments and townhouse-style accommodations; there are 429 total units for approximately 1,200 residents, including 189 family apartments. Fully furnished, the residences include fully-paid utilities, air-conditioning, WiFi, an on-site fitness facility, a community-service center, green space, and playgrounds.

The complex is a bid to keep MSU competitive with surrounding apartment complexes, with the advantage of on-campus amenities and services.

Sparty's Market at the very north end of the building serves visitors needing small-market items, but is a convenience for students and families living in the 1855 Place Residences.

The store features prepared foods and grill items, pre-packaged and self-serve bulk foods, a bakery station with coffee and fountain drinks, fresh fruits and vegetables, a dairy case, deli sandwiches, household items and more.

Sparty's Grill, located within the market, serves hot breakfast dishes; pub fare; fresh-roasted grill items such as vegetables and chicken; and comfort food options. The deli counter offers breakfast bowls, soup, sandwiches and pizza by the slice.

Straight to the Point

Market Update - Continued volatility and larger intraday swings led to another tough month for equities in December with domestic markets leading the way lower. Bonds had a small rally and ended the year flat after being down over 2% at different points during the year. Overall, 2018 was a difficult year for markets with the vast majority of global stock, bond and commodity markets ending in the red in varying degrees. We enter 2019 with more volatility and lower corporate expectations as evidenced by Apple's recent miss in forecasted earnings. I know making \$85B a quarter isn't what it used to be. Additionally, the China trade dilemma, the recent mixed signals from the Fed and lower corporate earnings estimates carry our current reality.

Investment Implications - As we stated in our most recent note, in these market disruptions the easiest thing to do is to do the wrong thing; react emotionally. We are experiencing a slowdown, much like we've seen at points during this long expansion and bull market. The battle is now between a recession and if we'll soon pull out of this funk. While this pullback feels more severe, the overall economy doesn't show typical signs that it's headed for a recession. For now we are recommending a mix of offense and defense. The offense—reallocate to your normal equity levels with quality, and the defense—do not try to time and guess the turnaround point. Maintain diversification and don't panic. Stay cautious but be proactive as well.
