## Annual meeting to feature elections, Dr. Thomas Glasmacher, quilt giveaway

lan to attend the MSU Retirees **Association Annual Luncheon** on Tuesday, May 2, at the University Club. Thomas Glasmacher, Ph.D, FRIB Laboratory Director, will be our guest speaker and will give us a FRIB update.

Glasmacher leads the worldunique Facility for Rare Isotope Beams (FRIB) Laboratory, a U.S. Department of Energy Office of Science scientific user facility owned and operated by MSU. Hosting what is designed to be the most powerful heavy-ion accelerator, FRIB enables scientists to make discoveries with rare isotopes about how the universe formed, while advancing innovation in medicine, nuclear security, environmental science and more.

As laboratory director since 2015, Glasmacher oversees FRIB's research and education missions, the advancement of core capabilities, and technical innovations that advance discovery and the state of the art.

Glasmacher earned an M.S. (1990) and Ph.D. (1992) degrees in physics from Florida State University. He joined the National Superconducting Cyclotron Laboratory at MSU in 1992 as an NSCL Fellow, in 1995 he joined the MSU faculty in the Department of Physics and Astronomy, and is an MSU University Distinguished Professor since 2009.

In 2008, Glasmacher led the team that prepared the winning FRIB proposal and served as FRIB Project Director for the 13-year project that was completed on bud-

get and ahead of schedule in January 2022.

In addition to listening to Glasmacher, attendees will enjoy good fellowship and food, help elect officers, meet the MSURA scholarship winners and celebrate the volunteer of the year.

Also, attendees will have a chance to take home the beautiful quilt crafted by Janet Munn, who started the quilt, but sadly passed away in



# Retired MSU art historian, professor hopes to continue research and travel

tarting her career at MSU as the Director of the Kresge Art Museum in 1986, Susan J. Bandes dedicated countless years of her career toward enriching the art programs on campus while expanding exhibitions that drew in crowds.

Susan J. Bandes' appreciation for the arts started during her childhood growing up in Manhattan, New York, as her parents took her to see many shows and exhibits in the city. It was not until between her freshman and sophomore years of college that she realized how much more a career in the arts had to offer.

"I am not a practitioner, but rather a historian," Bandes said. "After seeing all the study abroad options that a major in art history had to offer, I thought, 'what's not to like?"

After receiving her PhD, specializing in Roman Baroque painting, Bandes took a teaching job at a small women's college in Virginia and was also assigned as the head of the art gallery. With no prior experience, this was a steppingstone in Bandes' career and helped her realize her affinity for working with physical artwork and interpreting

them. Between then and her time at MSU, she worked in Washington, D.C., at the American Alliance of Museums and then moved to The Getty Trust in Los Angeles.

Speaking of her time at The Getty Trust, Bandes said, "I was one of the two program officers for their new grant program. It was great. We had projects from all over the world and there were very few rules regarding what we could fund. Eventually, I realized I wanted to work with the collections instead of waiting to hear how the projects went."

That is when Bandes began her career at MSU. The staff at the Kresge Art Museum was small when she started, but that gave her the room to do a lot of art curation rather than only directing. Through this, she was able to expand her knowledge beyond 16th and 17th-century art.

"I credit my early years at the Kresge Art Museum for broadening my eyes to art from all different cultures. Now I am pretty eclectic in all my interests in art," Bandes said.

In 2010, The Kresge Art Museum was beginning to transition into what is now the Eli and Edythe Broad Art Museum, and Susan saw that as an opportunity to pursue

full time teaching at MSU, focusing on art history and museum studies.

Her ability to explore her interests in an expanding and encouraging environment at MSU allowed Bandes to teach classes on topics that she herself wanted to learn more about. After teaching a course about modern architecture, she was inspired to learn more about local modernist architecture, which led to the publication of her scholarship in a book titled, "Mid-Michigan Modern: From Frank Lloyd Wright to Googie."

"It is almost like a full circle moment," Bandes said. "My undergraduate senior thesis was about a building in Manhattan, and it took me that many years to come back to a passion that I did not realize I had. I began research in 2012 and I wrote about 150 different buildings in the Lansing area. It definitely served my curiosity well and excited me to rediscover Michigan's architectural heritage."

Bandes officially retired in May of 2021. She was awarded the College of Arts and Letters inaugural Legacy Award and gave her Legacy lecture in the fall of 2022 before a packed audience at the Kellogg Center and a virtual audience around the world. The faculty that win these awards are nominated by colleagues that feel they deserve the recognition.

"Over the past thirty-five years, her tireless work as museum director, scholar, curator, teacher, and mentor

has elevated the national profile of Michigan State University," said Candance Keller, who nominated Bandes for her award. "... Raising the national and international profile of Michigan itself, her recent highly successful publications and standing-room-only public lectures have highlighted the important role that the state's architects and designers played in the development of American Modernism."

After the hardback edition of her book sold out, Bandes spent the early part of the pandemic researching and writing in order to add a chapter for the paperback edition of her book. This includes newly discovered architects and buildings she hasn't written about before.

"My retirement looked a little different because it was in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic," Bandes said. "I continue to do lectures in order to keep me involved, and I am really enjoying my time so far."

Still in the early years of her retirement, Bandes hopes to stay busy with new research, occasional lectures, and most importantly, traveling. She hopes to one day be able to visit Scandinavia and countries in eastern/southern Asia; however, for now, she is enjoying the spare time to reconnect with friends and to nurture those friendships.

"I would encourage people to pursue their passion. With enough courage and gumption, it could work out," Bandes said. "At the end of the day, my goal is to stress the importance of not just art history, but history in general, and I will be doing that for many years to come."

#### **Straight to the Point**

Market Update - The first two months of 2023 have been a perfect microcosm of where things currently stand for investors. That is to say, no one knows for certain in the short term. This is especially true of inflation, as recent data has shown a somewhat unexpected uptick after a few months of steady declines. Inflation is likely to ebb and flow, and take markets with it. Based on prior examples, inflation comes and goes in waves and can sometimes take quite a while to steady - perhaps as long as several years. As a result, investors have had little choice but to adjust their expectations. Markets are now pricing in three more 0.25% rate hikes this year, with virtually no expectation of rate cuts. This is a meaningful departure from where we started the year and in our view reflects a more reasonable set of expectations.
